But there are things you can do to decrease your chances of having a heart attack or stroke such as correct diet, proper medication and daily exercise. Come hear a medical scientist's interpretation of the recent discoveries from the National Institutes of Health of how aging changes our heart and arteries contributing to heart attacks, strokes and high blood pressure. The subject is challenging but the knowledge might just save your life. Class size is limited to 15 students to allow for a thorough discussion.

We'll then review ways technology can be used for communications (iPhones, email, instant messaging, and Voice over Internet). We will survey today's social networks (Twitter and Facebook) and explore ways of getting information (Internet browsing, mp3 players, podcasts, ebooks, and audio books). We'll review some of the basic considerations of digital camera technology. Finally, we'll explore the mental and physical benefits of computer game technology for mature adults.

Steve Shank has over 40 years of domestic and international sales, marketing and business development experience. He was vice president of marketing and business development for Zantaz, an electronic archiving company, and was the founding president of Symantec. While at Apple Computer, he created a multi-tiered retail network, including the founding of Apple Australia, now more than \$1B each. established and ran divisions of two well-known high-technology companies. He received B.S.E.E. and M.B.A. degrees from Purdue University and a M.S.E.E. degree from Stanford University.

The second semester will detail the history of the United States Navy from the end of the Spanish American War up to the present day. We will use both lecture and discussion to review the major firsts, events and timeline of the history of the United States Navy. Our emphasis will be on historical events that shaped the Navy, major battles, technological innovations and the men who made the Navy of yesterday and today.

This study includes, but is not limited to, the New Testament Scriptures, the early church councils, and the writings of people from this period. Many of the issues facing the early church have continuing relevance for today. The class will be a mixture of information sharing and class discussion.

Stanley A. Nelson, Ph.D., received his undergraduate degree in general studies with a major in psychology from Virginia Commonwealth University. His graduate work in theology was completed at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas where he received masters and doctorate degrees. He has done postgraduate studies at Union Seminary in New York, Regent's Park College in Oxford, England, and the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, California. He has served as a theological teacher in the Nigerian Baptist Theological Seminary in Ogmoboso, Nigeria, and at Golden Gate Baptist Seminary in Mill Valley, California. Since retirement he has been guest professor of theology in Taipei, Taiwan. He is author of *A Believers' Church Theology*, and numerous articles in theological publications.

This is a basic Spanish conversation course. Listening as well as speaking the language will be emphasized. It will also include reading and writing. Each lesson will revolve around a theme: school, friends, work, sports, shopping, etc. Basic grammar and syntax will be introduced in situational contexts only when needed for clarification. There will be many situational and thematic exercises and activities instead of mechanical drills. The culture of Spanish speaking countries will also be explored as reflected in poetry and literature. Optional cultural reading will be recommended. The primary aims of this class are to

give each student a basic knowledge of Spanish upon which to build, to encourage every student to continue language study, to enjoy reading Spanish literature and poetry, and to help students interact with our large Spanish-speaking community here in Arizona.

NOTE: Additional course fee of \$50 must be paid at time of registration.

Bob Burnett has more than 30 years of experience in education and has taught Spanish, Italian, French and Russian at the intermediate, high school, and college levels. He supervised the teacher training of the Peace Corps candidates and teachers from Malloy College in Rockville Center, New York. Bob is a popular Spanish teacher in the ASU Lifelong Learning programs.

Creative Writing

This course is for anyone interested in improving and enhancing their writing, whether it is poetry, fiction, memoirs, or non-fiction. Contemporary free verse poetry will be used as a focal point but it is not an attempt to turn everyone into poets; rather, the compressed nature of poetry lends itself to improved writing techniques that transfer to diverse writing genres. Writing exercises will be provided. This class is a working writers' workshop which provides an opportunity to have material critiqued in a non-threatening and supportive manner. Although the course is primarily for advanced writers, beginners may enroll with the instructor's permission.

Jim Mitsui received his M.A. in English (creative writing) at the University of Washington, where he studied under William Stafford, Richard Hugo and David Wagoner. He has published four books of poetry, his latest, *From a Three-Cornered World*, the University of Washington Press, 1997. A recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship, Jim's work has been published in over 200 magazines, anthologies and textbooks. He has taught Poetry Writing Workshops at ASU's West campus and currently teaches poetry writing online for Southern New Hampshire University as well as the Phoenix Arts Commission's Artspace Program.
